

This information is for patients who have been prescribed a Kelhale[®] (beclometasone dipropionate) Metered-Dose Inhaler

How to use Kelhale[®]

Please read the section in your package leaflet entitled “testing your inhaler”.
A new inhaler first shows “200” in the dose indicator window,
denoting the number of puffs in the inhaler.



- 1 Only use your inhaler when standing or sitting upright.
- 2 Remove the mouthpiece cover. Check that the mouthpiece is clean and free of loose objects.
- 3 Place your thumb on the base of the inhaler below the mouthpiece and hold with your forefinger on top on the canister. Breathe out as far as is comfortable.
- 4 Hold the mouthpiece between your teeth, with as little pressure as possible. Use your lips to form a tight seal.
- 5 Breathe in slowly and deeply through your mouth. Just after you begin to breathe in, press down firmly on the top of the canister. This will release a dose of medicine. Continue to breathe in steadily and deeply.
- 6 Hold your breath for a few seconds after removing the inhaler from your mouth.
- 7 If your doctor has told you to take more than one puff per dose, wait 60 seconds, and then repeat steps 3-6.
- 8 Replace the mouthpiece cover.
- 9 Rinse your mouth thoroughly with water to prevent sore mouth or thrush.

Dose indicator

- On the back of your Kelhale[®] inhaler is a dose indicator to help you keep track of the amount of medicine left in the canister.
- A new inhaler contains 200 doses. As you use the inhaler, the number on the back will reduce from 200 to 0. Every dose you take counts, but **the indicator changes only every 20 doses.**
- You should request a replacement inhaler when you get to 40 doses remaining.
- When the dose indicator displays 0, stop using the inhaler. This is because the canister may no longer deliver a full dose.

If you get any side effects talk to your doctor, pharmacist or nurse. This includes any possible side effects not listed in the package leaflet.
